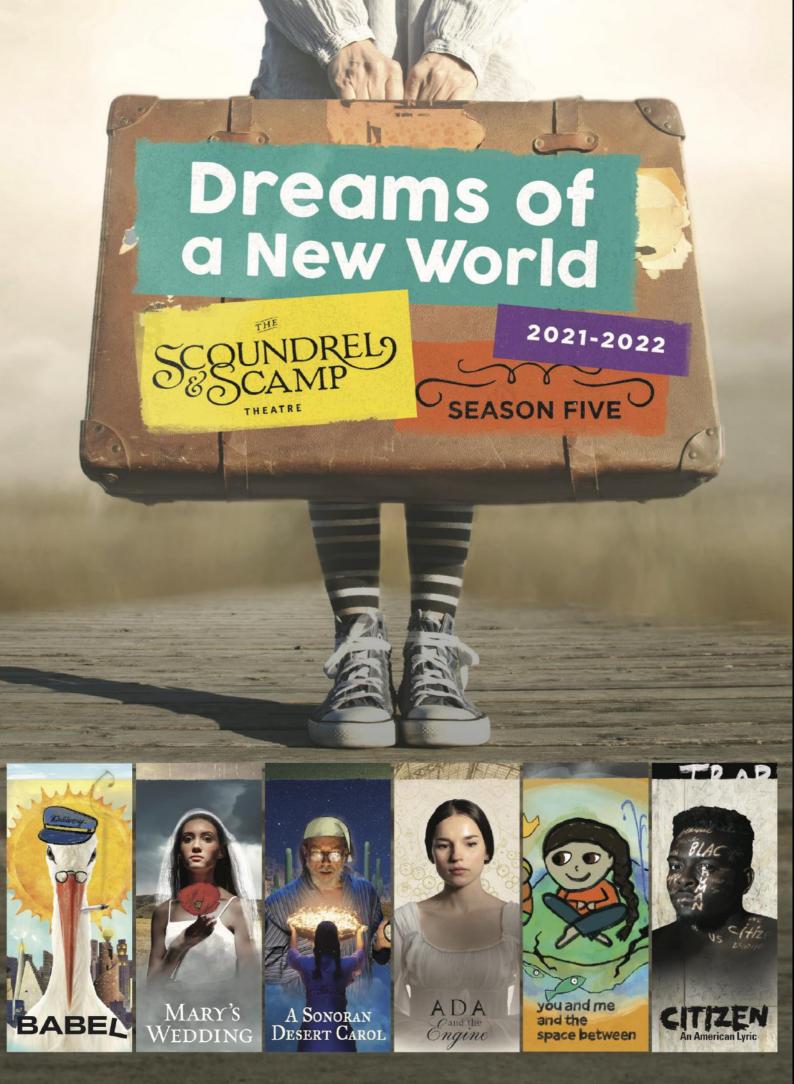

### DIRECTOR NOTES

Love and war, each inevitable, irrational, and intense provide a rich landscape for conflict. It is no wonder that they remain endearing narrative partners. It is no wonder that the story repeats itself. And... it is no wonder we never tire of hearing it. WWI is especially rife with themes of love and war. We have at our disposal scores of books and films and poetry infused with lyrical testimony of the broken heart against the backdrop of honor. While WWI may have passed from our living memory, it is through these artifacts that we still seek to negotiate the overwhelming loss.

Via a collage of things fantastical, things recalled, and skewed memories, Mary's Wedding offers a complex terrain for exploring not only love and war, but the thin veil between fact and fiction/fantasy and reality. It is a world where Mary and Charly might come to terms with the consequences of their actions and the inevitability of war. Their struggle is our struggle. In a world that is at once brutal and brilliant, it may serve to remind us how much is lost at the hands of chaos. It may serve to illuminate where we stand when the curtain rises on yet another episode. It may serve to remind us that love prevails. I don't know.

**Susan Arnold** (*Director*) is honored to be working again with The Scoundrel & Scamp Theatre. She has worked extensively in the performing arts sector as an actor, director, writer and producer in both stage and film. A native of Michigan, she served as Artistic Director for the critically acclaimed Attic Theatre in Detroit, where she also wrote and produced the award-winning play, GOOD FRIDAY. Her local directing credits include SAINT JOAN (George Bernard Shaw), ROUGH MAGIC (Roberto Aguirre-Sacasa) and THE LANGUAGE ARCHIVE (Julia Cho) with Winding Road Theatre and GLENGARRY GLEN ROSS (David Mamet), LAST OF THE BOYS (Steven Dietz) and STONES in HIS POCKETS (Marie Jones) with Beowulf Alley Theatre. Susan is the recipient of several theatre excellence awards for both performance and direction, and a member of Actor's Equity Association and Screen Actor's Guild/American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.



Jennifer Westbrook (Assistant Director) is a recent graduate from the University of Arizona School of Theatre Film and Television with a BA in Theatre Arts. Jennifer is excited to be working for the first time with Scoundrel and Scamp Theatre. She has worked as a dancer and actress previously but is honored to be the Assistant Director to Susan on Mary's Wedding.

**Stephen J. Dunham** (*Charlie*) has been involved in theatre in the greater Tucson area for over 20 years. He formally attended Pima Community College working towards a degree in theater and the fine arts. As a father of one, he put theatre on hold for a while, but came back and was involved in several shows shortly before the pandemic, then like many, had another hiatus from the stage. Post-pandemic he has been in a couple of local musicals, "West Side Story" and "A Chorus Line" and now he is very thrilled to be here at Scoundrel and Scamp doing his first non-musical play since the pandemic!



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### MUSIC DIRECTOR NOTES

### The more I experience this play, the stronger I feel its resemblance to a piece of music...

There are the obvious things: it has parts that are quite lyrical, and overall I find it powerfully affecting, as people often find music to be. But there are other, more hidden things about it. Certain lines and certain scenes return again and again, transformed, much as musical motives return in a sonata and are renewed. Changed, either in content or in context; but reminding us of how they began, and conferring unity onto the piece. But this play is not so linear as a sonata. Locations, situations, even points in time itself flow seamlessly into one another, surreal and dreamlike. There's no rigid logic where one thing must follow another, as a sonata must have exposition and then development and then recapitulation. So really, it's much more of a tone poem.

I tried to make the literal music reflect this. There is an old Gaelic tune called "Mary's Wedding"-- and because many early Canadian colonists belonged to that heritage, I felt this could not be a coincidence. I took that single tune and transformed it into several different themes, which I hope reflect and amplify the emotional structure of this deeply emotional text. The transformations are sometimes quite remote, but they remain linked by their common source. There might be something in there about the underlying universality of this story, the horrifying ubiquity of war, the deep well of grief from which all who are touched by war must drink, and the fact that we all, still, must love. But then again, there's probably no need to read that much into it. The music is only there to support those who are telling you this story. Listen to them!

### THE PLAYWRIGHT



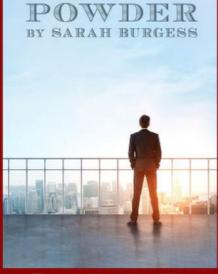
**Stephen Massicotte** (*Playwright*) was born in Trenton, Ontario, and spent his earliest years living on various Canadian Forces bases in Canada and Europe.

For the most part, he grew up in Thunder Bay, where he developed his interests in reading, film, and art. He studied graphic design at Cambrian College, and later, theatre at the University of Calgary. After graduating with a BFA in Drama, he stayed in Calgary to work as an actor, helping to found Ground Zero Theatre and The Shakespeare Company. With the Fringe Festival circuit success of his play, The Boy's Own Jedi Handbook, Stephen began to focus on playwriting.

In 2002, Mary's Wedding premiered at Alberta Theatre Projects and has gone on to have more than a hundred productions in Canada, the US, New Zealand, and the UK.

In the years following, Stephen has continued to write for the theatre, as well as opera, film, and fiction. His play The Oxford Roof Climber's Rebellion is the winner of the Gwen Pharis Ringwood Award for Drama at the Alberta Literary Awards and the Carol Bolt Award for Drama. The Clockmaker won a Betty Mitchell Award for Outstanding New Play and the inaugural Toronto Theatre Critics' Association Award for Best Canadian Play. He currently lives in New York City.

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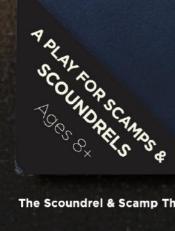
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
